## Introducing....

Noblesse is a Rwandan missionary who has a heart from the Laarim people of South Sudan. Noblesse spent 2 years working with an AIM team in a Laarim community but he had to return home to build his support base.

Noblesse is one of the first missionaries that Tubasange is supporting. His sending church is Gospel Community Church (the small church that we attended before the church closures) where he is their first 'official' missionary!

Support raising has been a difficult journey for Noblesse. GCC is such a small church they are unable to significantly contribute to his financial support, but they do what they can. As mentioned previously, few churches see the value or

significance of sending missionaries, and therefore few individuals in the church understand the significance of supporting one financially. Often families struggle to accept an individual's desire to be a missionary instead of having a 'real' job and earning a good wage so they can contribute back into the family, so even support from family can be difficult to raise.

After a year of hard work raising his support, Noblesse has finally been cleared to return to South Sudan. He will re-join the AIM team and spend another 2 years in the Laarim community. He had his commissioning service over the weekend and will leave this week. Please pray for him as he adjusts back to village life.

## **Teens Camp**

Teens Camp 2019 went well. All in all 67 campers attended from schools and churches around the country. It was a time of connection and learning and new relationships. One of our camp directors shared this story:

"There was one girl who came from a muslim family, who is the niece of one of our staff members. She came to receive Christ and not only that, she was serious. She was hungry to know more about Jesus and was wise and cautious when asking about false prophets, because she felt like her whole life those were the prophets presented to her. The most fascinating part of her story is that her father sent her to this camp knowing full well it was a Christian camp, and he said to his brother, our staff member, if she gets saved all the better. Her father was about to leave Islam."

And from one of our campers:

"I don't even wanna go back [home] 'cause I had the best times of my life. I pray that everyone will get the blessing to be here. My spirituality has increased...I won't turn back anymore and I am going to be just like you, I will change the people around me like you changed me...I will also pray that God will make you stronger and grow in your ministry."



Every camp we are amazed and encouraged by the way young people get to meet God in a new and different environment.

39 of these young people gave their lives to Christ this Teens Camp and we are rejoicing.
